The book is distributed to Filipino associations overseas which conduct Filipino language classes. CFO launched on December 7, 2006, the first-ever Internet-based teaching of the Filipino language, the Learn Filipino Program. Designed to target a wider audience of overseas Filipinos throughout the world, the course allows enrollees to learn Filipino at their own pace and at a very minimal cost.</p> <p>For 2011, CFO distributed 12 Guide to Learning Filipino textbooks and audio cassette tapes to Filipino organizations in Australia. In the Learn Filipino Program, CFO updated list of 296 enrollees and checked 68 examinations.</p>
